


Racial Equity Climate Survey

District-wide Survey


- Goal: Provide District with initial baseline and guidance on staff equity perceptions and experience (personal/dept/BART)



Roadway Congestion & Climate Risks:


- Persistent traffic














Transbay Rail Potential (Equity Weighted)



Defining Priority Populations

Link21 defines priority populations as the geographic areas where people are most impacted by negative economic, mobility, community, health, and safety outcomes. These outcomes are often correlated with race, ethnicity, gender, income level, and other historically underserved identities in the Megaregion.



AGENDA ITEM D: EAC Charter

Charter establishes member roles and responsibilities, including:

- Participate in virtual meetings every other month
- Provide input on policy development, and proposals for the Program
- Make formal recommendations to the Program team



AGENDA ITEM D: EAC Charter

Charter establishes guiding principals and values, including:

- Integrating lived experts (those who have lived experience in inequitable transportation and infrastructure) into Link21-especially for interim non-Board decisions.
- Supplementing other co-creation activities, such as co-creation workshops, to increase opportunities for community partnership and influence at key points in the program development.
- Introducing a community-driven body which has the benefit of long-term engagement with the program, which will allow for deeper discussions and stronger community alignment with how Link21 progresses.

Bylaws represent governance of the EAC, including:
